Child Death Review (CDR) and Fetal and Infant Mortality Review (FIMR) programs work to understand health care systems and social problems that contribute to fetal, infant, and child deaths and to identify and implement systems improvement and interventions to improve the lives of some of our most vulnerable women, infants, children, and families. Captain Madelyn Reyes, MA, MPA, RN

CAPT Reyes is a Senior Nurse Consultant in HRSA, MCHB's Division of Healthy Start and Perinatal Services. She is responsible for administering national perinatal and women's health programs, with an emphasis on infant mortality reduction and prevention. CAPT Reyes is responsible for managing 12 regionally and culturally diverse community-based Healthy Start programs serving about 55,000 of the most vulnerable women and infants with an annual federal funding of \$13 million. She also serves as the project officer for a research and training institute cooperative agreement with an annual funding of \$2.4 million. CAPT Reyes is co-lead for the Maternal and Child Health Bureau's (MCHB) Health Equity Initiative and serves as the Fetal and Infant Mortality Review (FIMR) liaison for MCHB's National Center for Fatality Review and Prevention.

CAPT Reyes received a Doctorate of Nursing Practice from Carlow University, a Master of Arts in National Security Studies from the U.S. Naval War College, a Masters of Public Administration with a Healthcare Concentration from Troy State University, and a Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing from the College of Mount Saint Vincent. CAPT Reyes joined the United States Public Health Service (USPHS) in 1997, after serving six years in the United States Navy.

Joia Crear-Perry, MD, FACOG

Dr. Crear-Perry is the Founder and President of the National Birth Equity Collaborative. Most recently, she addressed the United Nations Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights to urge a human rights framework to improve maternal mortality. Previously, she served as the Executive Director of the Birthing Project, Director of Women's and Children's Services at Jefferson Community Healthcare Center and as the Director of Clinical Services for the City of New Orleans Health Department where she was responsible for four facilities that provided health care for the homeless, pediatric, WIC, and gynecologic services within the New Orleans clinical service area. Dr. Crear-Perry continues to work to improve access and availability of affordable health care to New Orleans' citizens post the Hurricane Katrina disaster of 2005.

After receiving her bachelor's trainings at Princeton University and Xavier University, Dr. Crear-Perry completed her medical degree at Louisiana State University and her residency in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Tulane University's School of Medicine. She was also recognized as a Fellow of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

A proud recipient of the Congressional Black Caucus Healthcare Hero's award, Dr. Crear-Perry currently serves on the Board of Trustees for Community Catalyst, National Medical Association, and the New Orleans African American Museum. She is married to Dr. Andre Perry and has three children: Jade 24, Carlos 20, and Robeson 6.

Susan Hurtado, Community Specialist

Susan Hurtado is a social worker who works for the Tulsa Fetal and Infant Mortality Review project at the Tulsa City-County Health Department as their Community Specialist. Having over 15 years of experience working with trauma in children and family, she began conducting interviews with families who have experienced a fetal or infant loss in 2009. Working with both mothers who had children currently in the NICU along with mothers who had experienced an infant or fetal loss, in 2015 TFIMR completed a study to assess inter-conceptual protective factors and risk factors.
